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Wrexham Council looking to recruit more talent - following 'best ever' Children's Social Care inspection

Last autumn Care Inspectorate Wales carried out a week-long inspection of Social Care in Wrexham and reported several key strengths, including strong leadership and a new culture of raised expectations and standards.

It also said employees were positive about working for the council; morale is good, staff feel valued and managers are supportive and accessible.

So how did Wrexham's improvement journey begin? In 2020, a whole new Senior Management Team was established who, against the backdrop of the Covid pandemic, probably the most difficult period for British society in recent decades, re-designed service delivery to ensure that children were safeguarded and the promotion of their well-being was at the centre of everything they did.

Councillor Rob Walsh, Lead Member for Children's Social Care, explains:

"A few years back things were really tough in children's social care and we knew we had to change.

"First of all, we knew we had to improve the way social care were funded, and securing political support for extra funding and resource was crucial.

"Then the pandemic kicked in, but in many ways it was a catalyst for improvement – it forced us to quickly re-evaluate how we do things, the way we use technology, our processes, and how we make sure children's voices are at the heart of everything we do in Children's Social Care.

"We made a lot of improvements that we continue to build upon long after the pandemic, and I believe we now have one of the most forward-thinking social services departments in Wales. The CIW inspection is probably the best we've ever had."

As in every organisation, employees have been at the heart of progress at Wrexham Council, and making sure staff feel supported has been a cornerstone of success. Wrexham Social Care has implemented a Workforce Engagement Framework to embed a culture where the workforce inform service development.

Alwyn Jones, Chief Officer for Social Care, said: "The leadership team has embraced a coaching and learning approach which enables the workforce to develop and reach their full potential. Wrexham is fortunate to have a really talented and committed workforce who are dedicated to empowering children and families to achieve their best outcomes.

"CIW noted that employees feel valued, happy and have access to lots of support from management, and I think that's the main reason we've made so much progress.

"People are our most precious asset and there is a really strong, resilient 'can-do' culture across our teams that gives our employees confidence and allows them to innovate and thrive.

"This summer we'll be looking to recruit even more talent to a number of key roles. If you are committed to quality practice and improving outcomes for children, young people and their families and would like to join and be part of the continued journey of improvement, Wrexham's Children's Social Care is the place for you."

The Outcome of Innovation Occupational Therapy Service makes huge progress



12 months ago over 800 people were waiting for an occupational therapy assessment.....now there are fewer than 250.

Wrexham Council's Occupational Therapy Service has made huge strides over the past year – drastically cutting waiting lists while continuing to provide first-rate support.

The service helps people who are struggling with day-to-day living due to mobility or health issues – helping them find the right support so they can live as independently as possible and have a good quality of life.

In April 2023 there were 859 people waiting for an Occupational Therapy assessment, but by March 2024 the number had been slashed to 248.

The service has driven down waiting lists by focusing on managing demand, prevention and recruitment.

Councillor John Pritchard, Lead Member for Adult Social Care, explains more about the approach...

He says: "One of the most important things we did was outsource 600 assessments to an external provider. This made a big dent in waiting lists, and freed up our staff to focus on other aspects of the service.

"We also developed a self-help guide to encourage people to find their own solutions around independent daily living where possible. The guide has been shared across departments and is available on the council website.

"We also set-up a Community Assessment Clinic at the Cunliffe Centre, with mocked-up living quarters – including a bathroom and a bedroom – where assessments could be undertaken.

"Again this helped us work more quickly through our waiting lists and allowed us to sign-post people to the self-help guide where appropriate. "All of these things have made a huge difference, and although we still have work to do, our waiting lists are now much more manageable."

Recruiting and retaining the right people has also played a key part in the project, with specialist job roles being created, as well as initiatives to grow and develop existing staff.

Councillor Mark Pritchard, Leader of Wrexham Council, says the progress in Occupational Therapy is an example of how councils have to think outside the box.

He says: "Demand for council services is very high, and with limited resources, we have to manage that demand in the best way possible. We have to think differently and take a fresh approach.

"The work to reduce waiting lists in our Occupational Therapy service over the past 12 months is a fantastic example of this – we've looked at how we can do things differently, and how we can help people support themselves where possible.

"The Occupational Therapy team and wider social care department has worked incredibly hard and achieved a remarkable outcome, and although these are unprecedented financial difficulties for local government across the 22 authorities in Wales, it shows that we can still be innovative in how we deliver services to our communities."

Routes revealed for opening stages of 2024 Tour of Britain Women



<u>Guest Article – British Cycling "Tour of Britain Women"</u>

Today we can publish the routes for the opening two stages of the 2024 Tour of Britain Women in Wales, ahead of the Grand Départ in Welshpool in just 34 days.

The opening stages will see the world's top riders tackle some of Wales's most iconic roads and climbs, with thousands expected to line the streets to welcome the race.

Stage 2: Wrexham

Wrexham (140.2km, 1,570m ascent)

The race's second stage will start and finish on Chester Street in Wrexham's city centre and will take in some of the breathtaking scenery in Denbighshire, West Cheshire and Chester, with a further one sprint and two Queen of the Mountains segments along the way.

The peloton will travel north out of Wrexham, crossing into West Cheshire after just 20km, where the route ramps up alongside the Peckforton Hill Range, part of the Mid-Cheshire Ridge.

The route will then cross back into Wrexham, taking in the villages of Bangor-on-Dee and Overton, before the sprint will be decided in Johnstown. The race will then continue along a scenic stretch of the Llangollen Canal.Riders will have less climbing to contend with on this stage, however big crowds will be expected on the iconic Horseshoe Pass, which arrives at a pivotal point of the stage with around 30km to go.

The ensuing descent will set up a fast run-in to Wrexham for the stage finish to conclude the race's journey in Wales, passing through Minera and Rhostyllen, before a short hop back over the border to Warrington for stage three.

Stage two will start at 11:15, with riders expected to return to Wrexham for the stage finish at approximately 15:15.

Councillor Nigel Williams, Lead member for Economy and Regeneration, Wrexham said, "I'm once again really pleased to see a nationally important event such as the Tour of Britain Women being hosted in Wrexham, giving people the opportunity to see elite cyclists in a major competition.

"The race will give many the opportunity to witness and cheer on the cyclists, be that in the city centre for the start and end stages or as they pass through our communities. Please come to show your support and give them a warm Welsh welcome."

Tour of Britain Race Director, Rod Ellingworth, said, "Working with our partners we've been able to plot out two really challenging and entertaining stages in Wales to open the race, with some iconic climbs and opportunities for the sprinters too.

"We wanted the Tour of Britain Women to show off the very best of Britain's roads and scenery, and having spent a lot of time out driving the routes I'm absolutely certain that we've delivered.

"Finalising the routes in such a short timeframe has been a huge challenge, and only made possible thanks to the support of colleagues in Welsh Government, Conwy County Borough Council, Powys County Council and Wrexham County Borough Council, who deserve enormous credit for the commitment to the race and women's cycling more broadly."

20mph zones in Wrexham

As it stands, back in September of last year, 20mph speed restrictions were introduced on restricted roads throughout Wales.

The aims of this scheme were to:

- o reduce the number of collisions and severe injuries on them
- encourage more people to walk and cycle in our communities
- help to improve our health and well-being
- make our streets safer

Between April and July of this year Welsh Government have announced that they will now be undertaking a programme of listening in relation to their 20mph policy.

How will any future changes impact on speed restrictions?

We are not expecting wholesale changes to the current speed restrictions. Any future amendments will be of a target nature.

Any changes that we propose are unlikely come into force immediately. This is because we will need to follow statutory traffic orders and procedures. These changes can take from six months plus. There will also be a need to put in place tests against the guidance to ensure appropriateness of any changes.

We are inviting residents to contact us via our dedicated email address 20mphConsultation@wrexham.gov.uk. Here you may put your case as to why you think a particular road is not suited to the 20mph restriction, this must be a reasoned application as general demands are unlikely to qualify against the guidance tests.

As an authority we will be relying on a dedicated funding stream to action any future changes.

Deputy Leader with responsibilities for strategic transport Cllr David A Bithell said: "The implementation of the 20mph scheme has proved to be somewhat divisive, so I welcome the Welsh Governments programme of listening." I invite anyone with concerns over 20mph restrictions on roads in Wrexham to contact us via the dedicated email address, and to give reasons why you think the restrictions in a particular location should be amended."

Further report of Facebook Scam selling stalls for non-existent events

We have received a further report of a Facebook user fraudulently selling stalls for

non-existent events in Wrexham on a community Facebook page.

The report is similar to those previously reported in that it asks sellers to use "family and friends" rather than goods and services to make a £40 payment. The post has now been deleted.

This time the event was for craft and makers fayre at the Memorial Hall on 1 and 2 June. One person who was interested and asked further questions became suspicious when the responder seemed to be using Google Translate and they then reported it to our Trading Standards.

Trading Standards are advising everyone to be extremely careful when booking stalls for events and to check that the event actually exists before taking it any further.

The Memorial Hall has confirmed that this event is not booked.

Roger Mapleson, Trading Standards and Licensing Lead, said, "This is extremely worrying for genuine local event organisers.

With the popularity of Food Festivals, Artisan Markets and local fayres in Wrexham it's important to check and double check that the event actually exists and the seller is legitimate.

"A quick email or phone call to the venue itself or to those whose land it is on, is a good way to check if it's taking place and if so, who's organising it."

Ringing out for Peace




