New Grant Scheme for City Centre Shops and Commercial Properties in Wrexham



Retail and commercial property owners are being invited to apply for a new grant designed to help re-energise Wrexham City Centre.

Wrexham Council will use £220k of Transforming Towns funding to offer grants of up to £50k to enhance building frontages and bring vacant commercial floor space back into use.

Transforming Towns is a Welsh Government initiative designed to help regenerate town centres, ensuring they continue to play a key role in local economies and communities.

Who can apply?

Grants are available to retail and commercial property owners with premises in the city centre.

Applications are also welcome from leaseholders with seven years or more remaining on their tenancy and written consent from their landlord to carry out the proposed improvements.

What can the funding be used for:

This money can be used to help fund external works to building frontages, including:

- Shopfronts
- Improved display windows
- Signage improvements
- Windows and doors
- Roofs and chimneys
- Rendering and structural works

Internal works – and improvements to energy efficiency (e.g. enhanced insulation) – may also be eligible alongside a comprehensive package of external improvements.

A word from our Board Chair:

Hello and welcome to the latest edition of the Youth Work Bulletin.

During the month of June, we celebrated "Youth Work Week."

I always look forward to this time of year when we share experiences and reflect on the difference Youth Work makes for young people, our communities, and our country.

This year, the theme was "Why Youth Work?" I was so inspired by the stories that were shared and examples of how Youth Work enables young people to thrive.

Leading up to Youth Work Week, the Board met with the Cabinet Secretary for Education and Buffy Williams, MS Chair of the Children/Young People's Education Committee as well as young people to discuss the importance of Youth Work and the Board's work. This was a great opportunity to hear directly from young people from different backgrounds about the impact of Youth Work on their lives.



I took part in my first ever podcast with young people at St Mellons Youth Centre, and they asked me some fantastic questions about funding, the importance of wellbeing and having fun, and how can they make change happen in their communities. They shared with me their views on how Youth Work allows them to be who they truly are, having a sense of identity and belonging. I also had the pleasure of being a speaker at the Professional Association of Lecturers in Youth and Community Work Conference at Wrexham University.

I also attended the Deaf Cool Club Youth Centre in Cardiff's City Centre. I love this safe place for the young deaf community in Cardiff, run by talented staff and volunteers. It is an example of how our youth services can be shaped around inclusion and equality of access. All this demonstrated that Youth Work is very much alive, and as a Board, we are building strong foundations as we go forward with the implementation of our work for the sustainability of Youth Work in the future.

I would like to thank all of you who have taken part in the Empower Hour sessions and webinars to enable the Board to hear directly from you as we progress our work on strengthening the legislation for Youth Work in Wales.

In August, the Urdd will be hosting a residential weekend for young people on behalf of the Welsh Government to inform the work on developing a youth led governance structure.

New UK Government

As an arm's length body of the Department of Health and Social Care, we paused some of our communications in the run up to the general election.

Following the results of the general election on Friday 5 July we now have a new government and cabinet in post and our communications will return to normal.

The Labour Party's manifesto and plan for the life sciences sector includes commitments that we will play a part in making happen:

- lead the world in clinical trials by speeding up recruitment and improving the diversity of people who participate in research
- make it easier to take part in research via the NHS App
- continue the work to implement the recommendations make by Lord O'Shaughnessy in the review of commercial clinical trials in the UK
- create a new Regulatory Innovation Office to help regulators update regulation and speed up approval timelines

We are looking forward to working with the new government to realise these.



As part of our 'Make it Public campaign', we've published new insights into barriers to registering research.

The insights were developed at our Make it Public workshop. The workshop saw more than 100 people from across the research sector come together to discuss research transparency and how to achieve 100% registration of clinical trials on a publicly accessible database.

Attendees identified four key themes as barriers to registration, which will inform our work to achieve 100% registration.





First Minister Vaughan Gething announces resignation

Minister Vaughan Gething has announced his resignation. It comes after several Welsh Government ministers stepped down earlier today.

The First Minister has been under enormous political pressure over donations to his leadership campaign and his handling of a leak from a Whatsapp group.

Ministers Jeremy Miles, Lesley Griffiths, Julie James and counsel general Mick Antoniw submitted resignation letters this morning.
